

Berkeley scientist, Dr. Rash B Ghosh, Inventor of Hydrogramin addressed Global water crisis and became the Nation's worst Victim of elder abuse, racism, 3 False felony charges, and conspiracy caused by high officials of his own city Gov.

Ghosh v City of Berkeley et al

I, Felix Motzoi, a PhD. physicist and research scientist at UC Berkeley have been a tenant of Dr. Rash Ghosh nearly 2 years. I have had the opportunity to observe Dr. Ghosh, his daily activities and his work on the water crisis, and am impressed with his dedication and devotion despite ongoing harassment by the City of Berkeley.

I have witnessed such harassment pertaining to my apartment at 1248A Ashby Ave. where I have been living quite happily without problems. I have a small studio apartment where the electrical heater was functioning with no problems. I observed that the City required Dr. Ghosh to do new electrical work, which ended up being bulky and ineffective, and which required significant investment on his part. PG&E also contributed to the problems by not expediting the new service connection, and accusing me of "stealing" electricity, which was an absurd claim (my bill was increased significantly as a result of the alleged "stealing" period, during which I was out of town and used no electricity). They required me to provide all my personal information for a lengthy investigation, which kept my apartment hostage without power for a week, but I was never provided the results or an explanation. I provided a detailed letter to Dr. Ghosh about this matter, and I authorized him to use it to support our case.

The purpose of this declaration is to bring to the attention of the honorable judge of the San Francisco federal court that I discovered that the City of Berkeley targeted Dr. Ghosh, a senior scientist. I did not understand why, but later discovered that he had won a civil case against the Cal EPA. Since that time he has had trouble with the City regarding non-existent zoning violations. As I continued my research I found that the City targeted Dr. Ghosh to obtain his property and give it to their developer friend Bob Richerson and Ng Korman at a price of \$265,000 (well below market value). The City also kept the \$177,000 repair deposit which was never used for this purpose.


In general, the City does not enforce code violations regarding nuisances according to a study by Gregory Harper. In one case, the community was forced to seek relief but the court failed to impose receivership. The City passed stronger zoning laws in 1999, which were inappropriately used against Dr. Ghosh to seize his property, while a nearby established drug house for some 2 decades was not targeted. Please see the Alameda investigative report detailing this.

Similarly the City did not take any action regarding the Pacific Steel toxic waste site which was determined to be a public nuisance and created a toxic environment.

They also regularized the unpermitted and illegal work done by Mr. Ryan Lau, a zoning board member at his property who is still working for the City council member Darryl Moore.

Attached is also the letter of Noble Laureate Charles H. Townes who tried to help Dr. Ghosh to retain his house and the non-profit facility at 1700 Dwight Way and 2507 McGee. His letter clearly indicates that the property at 1628 Park Street, owned by a caucasian was converted from a single story into a 4 story residence without using a licensed contractor, architect, or structural engineer. But in the case of Dr. Ghosh's property, despite the use of the best available qualified professionals including the best architects and licensed contractors, he lost his property due to "code violations".

I declare under the penalty of perjury the foregoing are true and correct to the best of my knowledge.
